
What activities ... Well, where to start? The Spiderman Wall, Laser Quest,



KIP ON A SHIP 2015

This year a change to Kip on a Ship.as we were at the Royal Dockyard Chatham, now a Historical Heritage site and no longer a working dockyard. 30 cubs and 6 Leaders went.

We kipped on HMS Cavalier one of the last Destroyers brought into service on the Arctic Squadrons (built in 1943) and service in 1944.

Our weekend included old Signals, Morse Code and Wheel codes.

Next the Hearts of Oak museum (about designing and building

ships of wood) visited by half of us and the Lifeboat museum by the other half. This followed by the Ropery – learning about hemp, yarns, hawsers and cables including some of our members put to hard work making these ropes. Would you believe it 31 miles of rope to complete all rope requirements on HMS Victory.

We then went on board HMS Cavalier and set up for the evening. Fish and Chips for all followed by a two hour plus thorough exploration and full tour of the ship by Sarah, Chief Petty Officer Cadets.

Sunday morning started with knot tying and quiz on what we saw the previous day and then full breakfast.





Afterwards we went "through" HMS Ocelot one of the last submarines built which is now in dry dock as such originally the birth of Nelson's famous flagship Victory.

We changed over the two visits made on Saturday and included the loft of one building built like the upside down of a wooden ship and included the picture and model ship museum which included a short film about King George III's visit and the Battle of Jutland painting (where the youngest VC was awarded to a scout Jack Cornwell).

A great weekend with a big thank you to David Creigh for arranging. A very tired but full of fun and information group returned just a bit late due to the flat battery on the A team bus.

Troop News: Summer Camp 2015, Avonwick, Devon

Saturday 25th July 2015 and a 7.5 tonne truck pulls away from the Scout Centre loaded with tents, patrol boxes, a mountain of personal kit, and all the equipment needed for 28 scouts and 8 adults, (Ali, Paul, Mark, Mike, Rob, Mark, David and Katie,) to spend a week on a Greenfield Summer Camp in Devon on the edge of Dartmoor. By 8am the Scout centre is buzzing as parents say goodbye and two minibuses, (every seat taken,) and the canoe trailer pull away for the journey down to the West Country.

Several hours later, and after the inevitable delay at Stonehenge, the Troop arrive, and the scouts discover that the field is indeed green, and the only amenity is an outside tap up the hill in the farmyard from where they must fill their water containers, oh so regularly. Tents, dining shelters and toilet tents are pitched and the field becomes the home of 1st Claygate for a week.

Sunday, and the weather takes a turn for the worse – wet and windy enough to blow the notices off the camp noticeboard. The scouts set to, making their camp gadgets, tables, benches, mug trees, etc., and enthusiastically digging "the pit" – an essential waste disposal system

for the week. Mid-afternoon the rain stops, and many of the scouts happily take up the option for a paddle in the small river bordering the campsite- and discover that a Devon stream flowing off Dartmoor has its nippy side. Two whistles and the Quartermaster from each patrol goes to be briefed by Mike on the food to be cooked for supper: Sunday – it must be Roast Chicken with some of the trimmings – all cooked in camp

ovens on a wood fire.



Monday and Tuesday are activity days – Mountain Biking offsite on local trails, or kayaking on site led by our Canoe leaders Mike, Rob and Mark, and raft building. One advantage of the rain on Sunday is that there is a suspicion of white water on the river which adds to the fun. But before they can leave for activities the scouts have to cook breakfast, make sandwiches for lunch, and pass inspection – " if it doesn't move scrub it, and if it comes off when scratched by a fingernail scrub it again. " The patrol has to pass the same inspection after the evening meal and before being allowed to visit the onsite tuck shop run by Mike and Katie – and do so before the Tuck Shop closes. After tuck shop there is an evening activity, and a Patrol Leader's Council led by Ali and Paul, before hot chocolate and bed.





Wednesday is a quieter day: the scouts start to help Ali and David build an aerial runway at the far end of the site, collect kindling from the woodland across the stream, and plot the route for the planned hike on Dartmoor. After lunch each patrol gets to test the raft they have built. Will's patrol produced the champion raft that made it down the course completely in one piece. On Wednesday evening the Patrol leaders go off on an evening hike and the Assistant Patrol leaders take over the cooking of the evening meal, (and there is that inspection again ...)



Thursday brings perfect weather, hikers' lunch, (sausage,

primula cheese, crackers, fruit,) and an all day hike on Dartmoor. The scouts have the opportunity to practise their map reading and navigation skills as we do a circular hike from the Avon Dam. From the top, as we followed an old tramway, we could see for miles and miles, and when we get back to the car park we find that the ice cream van has waited! Back to site and Mike has got enchiladas for 36 in hand – not much of that left after a day on Dartmoor.

Friday morning brings a trip on the South Devon Steam Railway to Totnes and back: the scouts visit the museum and the shop, and quickly discover the delights of the on board buffet car. Back to site for lunch, a turn on the aerial runway for those who want it and then it is time to start striking camp – and the ultimate whole patrol box inspection which contributes many points to the patrol competition that has been running all week. Fish and Chips for supper, and as much kit as possible is put into the 7.5 tonne truck which has returned, driven by Hugh. The day finishes with a campfire led by Hugh and with songs and sketches from the scouts – we are joined by Ron and Mary Andrew – the farmers on whose land we have been staying, who have hosted two previous camps, and who are retiring so we may not be able to camp on their land again.

Saturday brings the end of camp. We pack up the final kit, walk the site to look for rubbish, and have our final flag break. The results of the patrol competition are announced – Ya Nan (Chris's patrol,) are the winners, followed by Good Olde Kimme, Sedentious, Me Gusta el Petite Pene and The Munchkin Army, and Chris is awarded best scout. Then it is back to Claygate, unload the kit, and reunite scouts with their parents, (and a much needed bath.)



This was the first greenfield camp the troop has held for four years, so was a new experience for all the scouts taking part, and a steep learning curve. But the scouts got to grips with the camp routines and working together in their patrols. Many thanks to David Saunders and Hugh Gostling for driving the truck, David Huddart for supporting the camp indefatigably, Sally Thorogood and Richard Baldwin for being home contacts, and our hosts, Ron and Mary Andrew. Scout District Night Hike - 17th October

The district night hike is finally here. The troop has spent the preceding half term preparing for this annual event, with skills training ranging from map reading and navigation to first aid, pioneering and problem solving. Everything was brought together with a practice hike through the West End woods one dark Monday evening.

Twenty-six expectant scouts are now gathered at HQ, waiting to be assigned into their teams and driven down to Shalford for the check-in. As with past years, there are two competition teams who will be walking on their own to gain points for the top troop





trophy. This year's competition teams are led by Kathryn Ainley and Will Boyce. For the younger scouts, there are three training teams, who complete the same course, but with the assistance of a leader.

Upon arrival at Shalford, teams must wait for their allocated start time. First order of business is kit inspection. Any missing equipment will cost points and could potentially exclude someone from walking, so this is a tense time. Fortunately everyone has remembered their 30p for the phone (quaint but true) and is ready to get started.



With inspection completed, each team is given a set of grid references, which must be plotted on their maps and used to devise a route. Two sets of maps have to be marked up and approved by the district before the teams are allowed to step out into the night.

The route takes in sections of the North Downs Way, including the spooky graveyard at the church of St Martha On-the-hill (10 points for spotting the memorial plaque to Yvonne Arnaud). Some tricky navigation through myriad footpaths sees the successful teams picking their way through the woods to find the Downs Link path as they loop back to the start point.

Along the way, checkpoints provide a place to stop for a rest and scouts are set a challenge to complete. Throughout the night, our teams are expected to deal with first aid situations, problem solving challenges and getting to grips with a primus stove to cook pancakes (no points available for predicting which of these was the most popular).

The route is quite long and very hilly in places, so making it to the finish before cut-off time proves challenging. Many of our teams are bussed the final mile or two back to Shalford, although Will Boyce's competition team makes it home unaided.

At time of going to press the results are unknown, but everyone certainly enjoyed the evening. Special thanks also to the following parents for helping with checkpoint duty and walking with training teams: Colin Coburn, Steve Fenton, Michael Lynch, Paddy Willard and Paul Wood.
