

We watched the cubs and parents put up their tents in torrential rain on Thursday evening but didn't dare laugh too much as the forecast for the weekend was not looking good. As it turned out we were extremely lucky and despite a couple of brief showers the weather was perfect for camping and we even managed to get all the canvas down dry on the Sunday, thereby avoiding the task of hanging up around 20 large tents in the group HQ to dry.

The scouts spent Friday evening putting up their tents and preparing a simple snack – Pot Noodles being the most popular choice – before turning in for the night. On Saturday, different groups rotated through various activities including collecting (far too much) wood, chopping and sawing, building camp gadgets and archery. The Patrol Leaders spent much of the day building shelters in the woods in which they intended to spend the night. The scouts did get a little damp during the 'water-testing' of their shelters but after various modifications and rebuilds the shelters were deemed fit to spend the night in. Two out of the three built even stayed up all night, which happily was a dry one.

On Saturday evening, after the scouts had built their fires, prepared their meals and cleared away, we had the traditional campfire with each patrol performing a sketch. Some original, some familiar, all were enjoyed by the campers although a few did get a little wet!

The Assistant Patrol Leaders had spent much of Saturday building a pioneering project to be used for the Going-up Ceremony on Sunday morning. It was an ambitious project and the impressive construction was variously described as a portcullis or, more worryingly, as a 'guillotine'







under which new cubs would pass and over which new scouts would climb. In the event all made it through in one piece.







After the going-up ceremony came the Scouts' favourite part of the camp, when they were required to pack away all the tents and equipment and take all that unnecessary wood back to the woodpile. After two nights with little sleep, quite a few scouts needed a little 'persuasion' to keep working but with everyone helping to put away back at the HQ we were done in good time for a very welcome Sunday afternoon rest.









District Cross Country Run

4 Inns Walk

The 4 Inns Walk is a tough competitive walk which takes place in the Peak District over some of the roughest moorland in Britain. Over 100 teams take part and there are 2 routes, 65K for older Explorers & Adults and a 35K route for younger Explorers, who walk with an adult, and older Explorers.

If you read last years Summer newsletter you will know that the Explorers entered 2 teams in the 2016 event with everybody completing the route. Well this year everybody was back wanting to do it again and with many of the new Explorers wanting to take part as well we ended up with 16 walkers and 4 teams!!

The event took place on Saturday 1st April and with the start being over 200 miles away we travelled up on the Friday night and stayed in a church hall just outside of Holmbridge.

We were then up early on the Saturday morning for a short journey to the Snake Pass Inn which is the start of the 35K route. Once the teams had been checked in there was just time for breakfast before everyone had their kit checked.

We were allocated teams numbers 1-4 and so were the first to leave at 10am. The route leaves the Snake and climbs up to the top of Kinder Scout before descending down into Edale. From here its up again and then a long walk downhill into Chapel en-le-Frith. From here its up again to White Hall and then down into the Goyt Valley. This is followed by a long uphill section to the Cat & Fiddle pub and from here the last section is mostly downhill into Buxton and the finish.

I am pleased to report that everybody finished which was a fantastic achievement. The 2 younger teams, David, Jamie, Will, Toby, Tom & Gus finished in 11 hrs 22 mins, the girls team of Gemma, Emma & Kathryn in 8 hrs 45 mins and the boys team of Matthew, Joe, James & Philip who

> walked without an adult finished in 7 hrs 19 mins and finished 2nd in their category and missed out on 1st place by just 7 minutes!! although they did win a McDonald's from Simon for finishing in under 8 hours.

Orienteering




Orienteering is a sport which combines cross country running with map and compass navigation skills. If your scout enjoys being outdoors on a misty autumn morning, (or even a frosty winter one!) or wants to improve or develop map reading skills then Orienteering could be for them. An added attraction is the electronic dibber that is used at each control point to record progress around the course, and the excitement on receiving the resulting print out showing progress between controls (checkpoints.) Some scouts choose to compete seriously, while others use the events as map reading practice – an approach echoed by the leaders involved! Participation can also be used to sign off elements of the Chief Scout Gold Award and the Navigator Staged Activity badges, and there is also an Orienteer Activity badge.





1st Claygate Scouts and Explorers take part in orienteering via ESOC – the Esher Scouts Orienteering Club, which is run at District level. The orienteering season runs from September to March and ESOC attends the Southern Navigator "Saturday series" meetings which take place once a month on a Saturday morning. The format is very flexible with the

young people able to dip in and out, and for newcomers can join at any stage in the season.



Following a small grant ESOC purchased some special orienteering compasses for the 2016 - 17 season.

In 2015 -16 ESOC surprisingly found itself at the top of the team league for the first time, breaking a long standing duopoly. This feat was repeated in 2016 - 17. This was achieved by a number of scouts from groups across the District some of whom won their age categories. From 1st Claygate Alex D was placed 7th in

the B7 and under age group, and Will B was 5th and earned an orange badge in the B10/11 age group.

Other scouts and explorers from 1st Claygate who took part across the season and contributed

points to the ESOC total were: Jamie B, Ben F, Oliver P, Laurence E, Tom H, Oliver B, Ban D, Mackenzie B, Jack C, Joe C, Will B, Archie T, Sophie H and Lucie T.


On the Day of the Parade we assembled on the green outside the shops at Hinchley Wood, along with members of; Cobham, Hinchley Wood and Oxshott.


So why were we there? St George's Day is certainly more recognised nationally as the Patron Saint of England. However, Baden Powell made St George the Patron




Saint of Scouting back in 1907 so Scouting has always been aligned with St George's Day.




Cubs Day Hike
