## District Cub Pinewood Derby



All three cub packs were represented in this year's Pinewood Derby, with 39 cubs entering from around Esher District.

"Pinewood Derby?" – no it doesn't involve horses, or hiking through woodland – but making a car from a standard kit to a particular specification and then racing the cars against each other on a special track. The event comes from the USA, where it is huge, and was introduced to Esher District via a US scouting contact of a 1st Cobham leader, and has been held for the last 7 years. This year's entry was one of the largest for several years.

As a precursor to the event itself, cubs signed up, and were then issued with a kit to make into a car at home, (with parental assistance, the emphasis being on assistance!) Cubs gave free reign to their imagination in decorating their cars — and there was everything from a mouse riding on a block of cheese, a rat, a unicorn, various varieties of racing car, to a minion. Cubs then assembled at St. Andrew's School in Cobham for Race Day itself. Cars were booked in on arrival and checked to ensure they met the specification, and allocated to one of 8 groups.

Then the racing started. Cars were raced along the track in pairs, each pair of cars racing twice, against all the other cars in the group, and eventually the whole group was sorted to establish which cars were fastest in each group. The odd running repair was undertaken to keep the cars "on the road" and the most stressed people in the room were probably the adults at the end of each track judging the winners — sometimes it was *very* close, and races had to be re-run, or go to a decider to find the faster of the pair of cars.







After the first set of races, slower cars were eliminated, and then a series of semi- finals were held, and then, (excitement mounting) the fastest 8 cars were raced in the final, and eventually a winner was established.



Although 1st Claygate was not among the medals, all cubs went home with a certificate and a badge for taking part, and enjoyed the afternoon.

Footnote: The kits for this event come from the USA and if imported directly attract a significant tariff (raising the cost of a kit from £6 to £16.) To continue this event the District are looking for either a sponsor who would be willing to contribute to the cost of imported kits, or somebody who would be willing to cut sufficient identical blocks of wood for distribution to the cubs to make their cars — wheels and axles are available locally. # District Explorer Activity Weekend Brecon Beacons Wales

On the Sunday, it still hadn't stopped raining, the indoor climbing proved very popular whilst those who didn't climb undertook a walk close to the Scout Centre.

Despite the weather it was a great weekend and an opportunity for Explorers and leaders from around the district to get together.

We are already planning next year's weekend which will be to Scammonden in the Pennines.











### **Project Merlin**


Project Merlin is the scheme to extend the scout centre to provide another large meeting room, doubling the size of the meeting room on the first floor of the Scout Centre. This will give us the capacity to hold two meetings in the evening at the same time, and thus potentially open a new Beaver Colony and new Cub Pack to enable us to offer



places to the many young people currently on our waiting list – at the moment we have places for only about half of those who wish to join.

We have estimated the cost of the extension at around £350,000. So far we have raised £160,000, so nearly half way, but that means there is still a long way to go before we can commit to the building

work. The detailed breakdown is shown on the attached chart:

Claygate Parish Council have been very generous and have given us a grant of £20,000. We have also received funding from the Kenneth Green Charitable Foundation, The Laing Charitable Trust and the Rowan Bentall Trust, the Co Op Community Fund, the Claygate Gardening Society and Flower Show, and donations via employer-matching schemes from BP, Barclays, Lloyds Bank and Rentokil Initial. We have applications pending with a number of other charitable foundations and trusts.

How can current parents help with our fundraising?

- First and foremost, please continue to support all of our regular fundraising events the Jumble Sales, Summer Plant Sale and Summer Fete.
- Please support our BIG Group-Wide fundraiser, the Thames Path Trek (see opposite), involving all our young people, leaders and parents, and we hope to raise significant funds through sponsorship.
- We are planning a new event, the Claygate Beer Festival, on 1st and 2nd June. This will be a ticketed event which, we hope, will become a more regular fundraiser for the Group in the years to come.



### Thames Path Trek

As part of the fundraising for Project Merlin, we would like to involve as many of the young people, parents and leaders in a single, major challenge this summer.





On the 7th July 2018, 25 teams from the group will walk the 184 miles of the Thames towpath. The Trek will be split into sections and the sections will be from the Source to the Thames Barrier, so while no team will walk the whole distance the combined effort will mean that 1st Claygate will have walked the route in a single day.





This will be a unique event for young people to take part in and absolutely resonates with the teamwork ethic of Scouting. The aim is to generate a challenge and excitement about the event and for the young people to gain the support of friends and family by way of sponsorship.

## Subscriptions 2018/2019



The subscription rate has been set by the Executive Committee for 2018/19 at £48 per term. This is a £2 increase over the rate for 2017/18.

About half of the increase will be used to cover the increased costs levied by the UK Scout HQ, Surrey County and Esher District – all of which are used to provide the backup support for our local groups, training, policies, and support for activities such as the Global Jamboree in the USA in 2019. The other half of the increase will cover increased costs at the Scout Centre, not least on maintenance (the 'new' Scout Centre is now 12 years old), insurance and on higher energy costs.

One way we manage to keep the costs of subscriptions down is through the use of Gift Aid. This raises almost £10,000 a year for the Group, without which subscriptions would be about £11 more each term. ## UK 3 Peaks Trek in 24hrs 11-13th May



A few months ago, over a drink at one of our local establishments, I asked a friend if she'd like to climb the UK 3 peaks with me and strangely enough she agreed.

Fast forward 2 months, numerous conversations and we now have a team of 6 mums who are rising to the challenge, a driver, transport and childcare sorted. Thank you Gary Ernest for agreeing to be our driver, some maybe envious of you driving 6 ladies around, others might not be able to think of anything worse but you will be well looked after! Thank you 1st Claygate Scouts for the use of your mini bus, we hope to raise lots of money for your project.

Climbing the 3 UK peaks in 24hrs has always been an ambition of mine and we're so pleased to be doing it as a fundraiser for the 1st Claygate Scout Hut 1st floor extension where my 3 kids have had so many amazing experiences and learnt so much.

To introduce you to the team, it's made up of 2 Beaver leaders; Joanna Shillington and Helen Maguire. Susannah Moffat is a Scout parent and Yris Byrne lives locally. The 2 other ladies in the team are Sheryl Burmicz and Sarah Clarke.

The 3 peaks challenge is not for the faint hearted- we will be climbing Ben Nevis, Scafell Pike and Snowdon all in 24 hrs. A total walking distance of 23 miles (37km) and total ascent of 3064m (10,052ft) with a total driving distance of 462 miles. About 13hrs walking time and 11 hrs driving time. Interestingly all my research indicates that it's sleep deprivation and not inability to ascend the peaks that prevents most from achieving their goal so pillows and duvets will be a must in the mini-bus!

We will be completing the challenge on the weekend of 11th May and to test out our slightly older than the scouts muscles and bones, we are completing a training weekend in the Brecon Beacons on 24th March with 2 back to back 9 mile hikes.

# World Scout Jamboree - North America 2019

A World Scout Jamboree is opportunity of a lifetime, it is an adventure beyond anything you can imagine. In 2019, 45,000 Scouts from almost every country in the world will camp together for 12 days of fun and adventure.



A World Scout Jamboree is a world Scouting event for young people aged between 14 and 18 and is a gathering of Scouts and Guides from all over the world for an exciting programme of global development, peace, cultural understanding, adventure, fun and friendship.

It takes place every four years in a different country. The first World Scout Jamboree took place in England in 1920 and since then 23 such events have been held.

The 24th World Scout Jamboree will take place at the Summit Bechtel Reserve, a 10,000 acre campsite, in West Virginia.

The event is being hosted by the Boy Scouts of America, Scouts Canada and Scouts of Mexico. This is the largest event delivered by Scouting worldwide and 45,000 young people and adult volunteers are expected to attend from over 150 countries.

I am delighted to announce after a tough selection process 1st Claygate will be represented at the Jamboree by **Chris Wilkinson** and **Hannah Wood**.

I look forward to hearing about their preparations and their experiences, so more from them in future newsletters.
